THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK – 1 CORINTHIANS 13: 4 – 8A and 13.

Love is patient, love is kind, it does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not selfseeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

<u>REFLECTION</u>: This chapter from Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth, is the lectionary reading for Friday.

As we approach Christ's Passion once more we are reminded of his great love. As Paul says elsewhere, God shows his love for us, in that Christ died for us – scarcely will one die for a righteous person, but Christ died for us while we were sinners.

Jesus taught us to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength and our neighbour as ourself.

He lived that out in a compassionate, caring, giving life, which was an example to all of us.

Our response, says Paul, in what is known as the chapter on human love, is to ensure with God's help that our love is genuine, not tainted by impatience, envy, boasting, pride, rude-ness, self-seeking, or hasty anger, or resentment (keeping record of wrongs). Truth is difficult to define, but it is, I think, about absolute honesty before God, about our failings, and a searching for what pleases him, rather than following after what is wrong in thought, word or deed (delighting in evil).

Where we see people in need of justice, mercy, compassion, we can in some small way try to protect, trusting in what is right. Life without hope is a meagre life, and faith in God is what gives us hope; leading us to persevere with our onward path through life.

The last sentence reminds us of the need for nurturing <u>faith</u> (a trusting belief in God's great love), <u>hope</u> in all that is right, kind and best, for us and for others; above all demonstrating a giving, compassionate <u>love</u> for others, as far as is possible in our personal circumstances and with God's help. Every blessing, *John*.
