THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK:

Jean and I have just been to Eastbourne, in East Sussex, for a few days besides the sea! If you like history, the area including Rye, Battle and Hastings (all of which we visited), are marketed as "1066 Country"

We are thankful for the opportunity and the health, resources and means of transport to make such a visit possible. It makes for sober and grateful thought when so many people, for various reasons, cannot get away.

We went by coach provided by a local firm, and they booked us into a seafront holiday in the centre of the approximately 2 mile promenade. They have a London Eye-type structure about 140 feet to its apex, which is known as the observation wheel. Some of our fellow travellers braved it, even though less than fully mobile!

Speaking of the coach, it was only half occupied, six people having cancelled on the morning of departure. Another sad fact was that the hotel was less than half occupied, the only other people being some who stayed overnight.

This brings one to think about the difficulties facing those whose living is based on the hospitality, leisure and holiday trade. We need to pray for them in these difficult economic times, because apart from local customers, they provide the shop window for the tourist industry, inviting and catering for overseas visitors to our lovely country, with its history, variety of scenery, music, art, literature
