#### **NEW CIRCUIT MISSION GROUP:**

All those who have an interest in and passion for mission as witness and evangelism are invited to join the new Circuit Mission Group.

Initial meeting: Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2023, 7.30pm at the home of Rev Stephen Levett, 151 Birmingham Road, Bromsgrove B61 0DJ.

The interest in forming such a group arose from the Circuit Vision Day 2 follow up meeting held on 20<sup>th</sup> September. An extract from the notes of that meeting reads:

'Two suggestions came from the meeting for follow-on Circuit level groups:

A Mission group – for people who are keen on mission. A full brief needs working out but would be for people who are keen to work in mission in terms of making disciples, be that through Circuit level processes and activities, and/or through shared learning that could then be encouraged in the local churches.

A Compliance group — a group within the circuit to call together, explore challenges and good practice and support local churches and individual officers in the churches with all manner of compliance issues (Finance, Property, GDPR, Copyright, Health, and Safety etc.)

The Circuit Leadership Team was asked to consider if and how these two groups might be developed and established.'

The CLT duly gave some time to the matter at their meeting October 19<sup>th</sup> and asked the Circuit Staff meeting to continue the conversation at their meeting on November 1<sup>st</sup>.

It was agreed a date should be set before the end of November in order to not lose momentum. The date of

Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> November was chosen to begin the gathering before the end of the year but to avoid the December and the business of Advent and Christmas. It is

recognised that all who are interested may not be able to attend on this date, but this is an initial meeting, and it is envisaged there will be future gatherings.

It is not envisaged that each individual church will formally appoint and send a representative. Instead, the emphasis is upon the group being a place for those with an enthusiasm for mission of outreach and are keen to keep it on the Circuit's agenda. As far as it is rooted in Connexional and Methodist priorities it is focussed on the God For All Strategy. In this context the focus of mission is very much that undertaken with the hope and intention of enabling others to become disciples of Jesus Christ.

The mission group itself will ultimately determine the purpose and priorities of the group. However, to help prime these considerations it is envisaged the group might focus on one or more of the following four areas.

- 1. Building on the Everyone an Evangelist/Talking Jesus process, facilitate across the churches and in the Circuit ongoing consideration of, equipping for, and engagement in witness and evangelism.
- 2. Encourage and co-ordinate people across the Circuit to support individual churches in specific evangelistic events and projects.
- 3. Support the current specific Circuit project intended to enable new people to become disciples of Jesus, namely Forrest Space based at Peckwood.
- 4. As a group envisage, plan and undertake evangelistic activities and events which might not be happening through, possible or appropriate for an individual church.

## THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK – HYMN 4 9 5 (part) by John Greenleaf Whittier

Dear Lord and Father of mankind forgive our foolish ways; reclothe us in our rightful mind, in purer lives thy service find, in deeper reverence, praise.

In simple trust like theirs, who heard beside the Syrian sea the gracious calling of the Lord, let us, like them, without a word, rise up and follow thee. ......

Drop thy still dews of quietness, till all our strivings cease; take from our souls the strain and stress, and let our ordered lives confess the beauty of thy peace.

Breathe through the heats of our desire thy coolness and thy balm; let sense be dumb, let flesh retire; speak through the earthquake, wind and fire,

### O still small voice of calm

**REFLECTION:** First a little biography. Whittier was an American Quaker poet, part of a group known as the "fireside poets". He was influenced by the Scottish poet Robert Burns. He was born 1807 in Massachusetts and died in 1892 in New Hampshire. He spent a large part of his working life in the publishing business, working for many American publications. He was also an advocate of the abolition of slavery in the U.S.A. Various of his poems were adapted for use as hymns, especially by the American Unitarian Church. This hymn was compiled from Whittier's poem "The brewing of Soma": its theme is "Calmness in God". It comes from the "Growth in grace and holiness" part of our hymnbook.

The sentiments are one of sorrow and regret as the worshipper comes to God, and a humble "forgive our foolish ways". This is followed by a plea for a renewal of our minds so that we can dedicate our "purer lives to service", and with a deeper sense of reverence, offer our praise.

Whittier continues by urging us to heed the "gracious calling of the Lord", and for our becoming willing to "rise up and follow" Jesus, which may involve personal sacrifice and some life changing experiences.

Next (v. 5 of the hymn) come some of my favourite words in the hymnbook, (along with the words "hands that flung stars into space to cruel nails surrendered" – from another hymn): "drop thy still dews of quietness, till all our strivings cease; take from our souls the strain and stress, and let our ordered lives confess the beauty of thy peace." These speak for themselves in a wonderful way and offer a calmness not known in daily life, as we metaphorically unload all our "strains and stresses" (and we all have them) to our loving God. In the last verse we are reminded of the still small voice of God from the life of Elijah, who eventually found God, not in the earthquake, wind or fire, but in the whisper of God in the silence. When we look for God, he can still be found in the unexpected places and bring stillness and peace to our hearts.
